Have you had that sinking EDINBURGH feeling on Friday at 5 o'clock? This morning the team from Liverpool presented their audit of referrals made for persistent bubbling chest drains. Kent et al found that guidelines published by the British Thoracic Society are not been followed. A well-attended database meeting

Extracorporeal Membrane Life Support is currently not available in all centres. The paediatric surgery team from Dublin have found that this has decreased their death rate over the 5-year period and advocate it use in complex paediatric cases.

Researchers from Germany will present their results from an animal study. A novel drug, which is totally synthetic, has been found to be effective in reducing bleeding after cardiac surgery and may be as good if not better than currently available therapy.

The Thoracic Surgeons will present a study that is sure to fire up debate this afternoon from Leicester. Although less invasive video-assisted thoracoscopic resection may be undertaken for Stage 1 cancer they argue there are no advantages over a traditional open operation.

Some wounds can be very difficult to heal and may be expensive for both the patient & the health care system. Nurses perfusionist Middlesbrough have used the patient's own blood and extracted growth factors. When directly applied to the wound as a gel, wound healing has been accelerated.

Skin blisters can be used to monitor the inflammatory response!
